Over the past two years, the Andrew Fuller Center for Baptist Studies has had to adjust to the challenges raised by the pandemic. The primary mode of this has been through our implementation of webinars. This past year, we were thankful to be able to host one on Nicene Trinitarianism, which had online talks by Prof Matthew Barrett on Anselm's doctrine of the Trinity, Prof Gwenfair Adams on the Trinitarianism of The Book of Common Prayer, and myself on the defence of the deity of the Spirit by Theodore of Mopsuestia in a debate with the Pneumatomachi in 392. We also held a multi-day conference on political theology in Canada in partnership with Heritage Seminary, and hope to make these talks available publicly in short order. To both the presenters and to those who joined us at these events, please receive our deepest gratitude!

Secondly, we also made all of our Occasional Publications available for digital download on our website and added two more to the repertoire: Michael A.G. Haykin, *Congregational Covenanting with God: A Forgotten Spiritual Discipline* and Caleb Anthony Neel and Geoffrey Chang, *Andrew Fuller and Charles Spurgeon: A Theology of Animal Life: Reflections in the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Centuries*.

The Complete Works of Andrew Fuller has also seen two more volumes published through the publishing house, Walter de Gruyter. These are Fuller's commentary on Revelation, edited by Prof Crawford Gribben and Fuller's defence of the missionary enterprise with William Carey, edited by Dr Peter J. Morden. The first of these is now available and the second will shortly be so!

As you will see below in this newsletter, there have been new additions to the fellowship and more events coming down the pipeline—with the organization of a conference on Tolkien in the planning stage as well. We look forward to seeing you there!

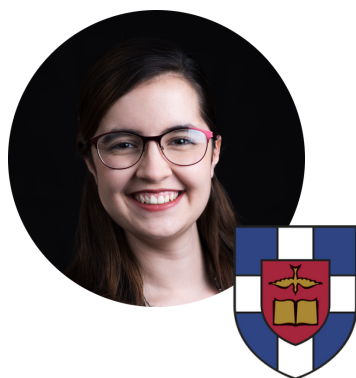
This year we are thrilled to welcome back familiar faces with our speakers who will explore Nicene trinitarianism and its enduring legacy!

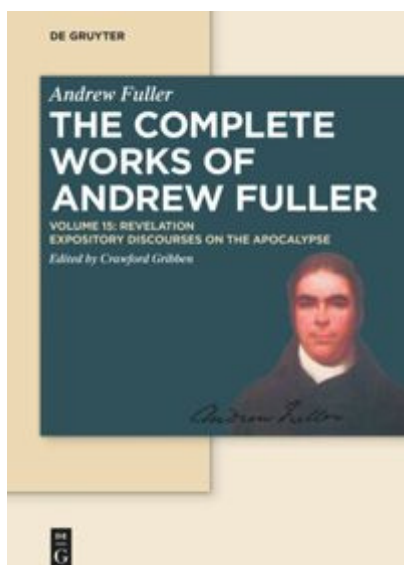
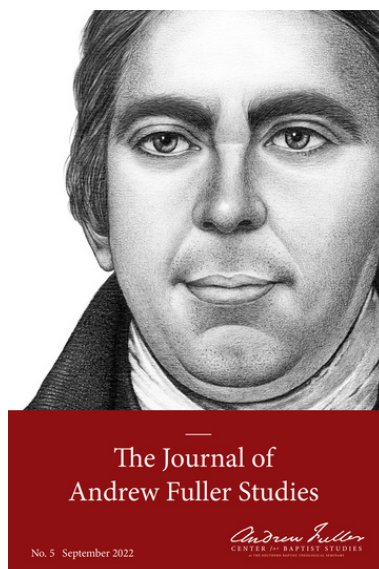
